"Live plants are very pleasing in an interior design," says interior designer Osirys Mendez, who with her partner Sa-brina Vela owns Mendez-Vela Design Collection in Miami. "They can create a tranquil environment and encourage relaxation.
They're proven to reduce stress, and they improve

"We need nature in our "We need nature in our homes to feel in balance within ourselves," says Paloma Teppa, founder of Plant the Future, a botanical design firm, art gallery and plant boutique in Miami. "Plants help with physical and mental health, and they bring great energy to a space."

atth, and they bring great energy to a space." They can also make the home quieter. "They're a sound barrier," Mendez says. "Also, caring for something, needing to water the plant or clipping it has psychological bene-fit. It's like having a pet."

### ATTRACTIVE TO BUYERS

Despite the hot real estate market, it's still a good idea to make a home that's for sale as attractive as possible. Developers and individual property owners are seeing the benefit of adding plants to the residences they are

trying to sell. During the height of the pandemic, when everyone was staying home full time, many people develo-ped a stronger appreciation for nature in their personal environments. says Candace Jorritsma, director of sales and mar-

Plants are important for private sellers, too. ""The biggest trend for 2022 has biggest trend for 2022 has been bringing the inspira-tion of nature inside your home," says home stager Sandra Holmes of Luxe Home Staging & Design in Dania Beach. "We always use greenery and flowers, whether they're real or faux. They warm up a space and give a feeling of calmness." calmness.

WHERE TO PUT THEM
Where should you place
plants and flowers?
"Every single room should have a plant so you can connect with the energy," Teppa says. "Put them on the dining table, on the balcony and in the littchen." kitchen.

"The living room and family room are where we use real trees, or silk ones," Holmes says. "In larger homes, there are corners, and it helps fill the space."
Live walls, in which

plants create a vertical natural design, are very much in fashion, Mendez says. "You can do a whole wall, or a design on a wall. You can also mix live plants, like ferns and succulents, with freeze-dried

hanging plants, is indeed popular, Holmes says. "It gives a boho look that's trendy with millennials."

Faux plants won't filter the air, but they can be beautiful and add to an

interior design.

Today's faux plants can be hard to tell from living ones. "Silk flowers and plants now look very real,"
Holmes says. "They've
come a long way in the
last few years."

Freeze-dried flowers and moss, which are different from plants allowed to dry on their own, are another alternative, Men-dez says. They are real plants treated with a cheplants treated with a che-mical process to preserve them in a form that's very close to their appearance when they were living. "They look real," Mendez says, and adds, "But not-

#### hing takes the place of natural plants." LIVE OR FAUX?

How to decide whether you want live or faux plants? "Think about how much

maintenance you want to do," Teppa says. "Normally, we ask the client if they have a green thumb," Holmes says. "If thumb," Holmes says. "If you're going to invest in live plants, you have to be able to take care of them. Many clients love faux. They never have to water again." "If you're a snowbird, you'll need to get a service to take care of your live plants," Vela notes. Not so for shorter trips: "There are a lot of self-watering planters that self-watering planters that work when you're trave ling," Mendez says.

#### RIGHT PLANT, RIGHT

Not every live plant will

thrive in every space.
"Pick the place where you want to put the plant and go from there," Mendez Before choosing a plant, don't be afraid to ask for

advice at a nursery. What kind of soil does the plant need? How often will it need to be watered? How need to be watered? How much light does it require? How often should you fertilize it? "We use a lot of desert plants," Teppa says. "They're very low mainte-nance." "Succulents are a nice way of adding green," Mendez says. "There's a huge rave on

"There's a huge rave on succulents right now,

Holmes says. You probably won't be able to grow most flowers

They love direct sunlight," Teppa says. A cou-ple of exceptions: orchids and bromeliads. "They do perfectly well indoors." Don't forget cut flowers. "Cut them at an angle,"

Vela says.

To pep them up: "Al-ways put ice cubes into the water," Mendez says. "It peps them up."
Enjoy your greenery. "Plants can be a very inexpensive way of decorating your interiors," Mendez says. "It can be fun creating aesthetically pleasing arrangements."
